

## **Introduction**

It seems that with every month that passes new threats appear to our historic battlefield heritage and the Battlefields Trust has new problems to deal with. Recently we have had to oppose decisions to build a wind farm close to the site of Naseby (1645) and an industrial incinerator close to the site of Shrewsbury (1403). Now the latest piece of cultural vandalism is the decision 'in principle' by Northampton Borough Council to allow land on the registered battlefield of Northampton (1460) to be turned into sports pitches which is likely to destroy any surviving battlefield archaeology. The planning permission process gives the Trust a further opportunity to stop this but as I'm sure you realise the Trust's resources are limited compared to the number of calls being made upon them and the support of the Trust's members is crucial in ensuring that the Trust's voice continues to be heard.

However, the news isn't all gloom and doom. A few years ago archaeological work at Naseby Battlefield enabled historians to pinpoint the exact site where Prince Rupert's Bluecoat Regiment of foot made their last stand on the evening of the 14<sup>th</sup> June 1645. On the 10<sup>th</sup> of June 2012 an impressive memorial was unveiled at the site in the presence of the present day Bluecoat Regiment of the Sealed Knot. This sort of archaeological work shows how much there is still to be learned from our historic battlefield sites.

### <u>Newbury</u>

Just two weeks after the unveiling of the Bluecoat memorial Newbury's MP, Richard Benyon, unveiled an impressive information panel at Wash Common, site of some of the fiercest fighting on the 20<sup>th</sup> of September 1643. As you probably know, Newbury was the site of two major Civil War battles, one in 1643 and the other in 1644. The Battlefields Trust has campaigned for years to preserve what is left of these two battlefields, we also argued that interpretation panels were needed to explain the story of the battles. Local history enthusiasts Nick Battle, Ian Ash and Dave Stubbs are to be congratulated on raising the necessary funding and making arrangements for the panel to be made and erected. They have really demonstrated what can be achieved with a little bit of determination and enthusiasm. It is hoped that in time there will be further information panels

#### **Future Projects**

August 2014 will be 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the outbreak of the Great War, no doubt there will be many commemorative events about the Western Front and the fighting in Flanders, but it is often forgotten that London itself was a battlefield and between 1914 and 1918 it witnessed the world's first ever strategic bombing campaign, first with Zeppelin airships and later with Gotha bombers. Though this campaign has been largely overshadowed by the bombing raids of the Second World War it was an enormously significant event and led directly to the creation of the Royal Air Force. The London & South-East Region is considering running a project to compile information on where there are remains connected to this campaign, this would include monuments, memorials, fighter airfields and anti-aircraft gun emplacements. Please let me know if you want to be involved in this project.

In 2015 we will also be celebrating the 800<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Magna Carta, the oldest constitutional document in the world, and the London & South-East Region are going to be regularly attending meetings of the Magna Carta 800<sup>th</sup> committee. Although it's not a battlefield we are particularly concerned about the way that Runnymede is preserved and presented, (the main memorial to Magna Carta was erected by the American Bar Association and until fairly recent years there was no British memorial to one of the most important events in English history). If any of our members have ideas about how this event should be commemorated I will be interested in hearing from you.

# Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> September, The Port of London at War, the Blitz on the

Dockland 1940. A walk led by City Guide Chris Everett. Meet at 10.30, at Trinity Gardens exit, Tower Hill tube, finish at the Prospect of Whitby pub, (nearest tube Wapping). The walk will be about 1.5 miles and take about 2 hours. Chris writes, "With War looming for a second time in Europe, Britain and London in particular began preparations for War. The Port of London would inevitably become a target for enemy bombers and defensive measures were put in place. With 8 million mouths to feed in the South East of England it was vital that Port operations continued despite enemy action. How successful were the measures? What worked and what didn't? Why were dockers safer at work than at home? What effect did Black Saturday the first day of the blitz and 6 years of war have on the docks and Port?"

Saturday 13th October 2012, Potters Bar October 1916. Clive Hammersley will be leading a walk looking at the dramatic events of the night of 1st/2nd October 1916 when German Zeppelin L-31, under the command of Kapitan Heinrich Mathy, Germany's leading Zeppelin ace, was shot down in flames over Potters Bar by Lieutenant Wulstan Tempest a Royal Flying Corps fighter pilot. The incident marked a turning point in the aerial attack on London during the First World War. Meet at "The Old Manor Pub", (Post code EN6 2JD), at 11am. The walk is about two and a half miles long, mainly on level ground. We will also be visiting the Potters Bar Museum and afterwards having lunch in the pub.
